IMPACT SUMMARY OF PUPIL PREMIUM FOR 2016 – 2017

- The pupils in receipt of Pupil Premium in Year six reached the expected standard across all subjects. Their progress was broadly in line with that made by all other pupils.
- In 2017 one of 3 pupils in receipt of Pupil Premium in Year 2 reached the expected standard across all subjects.
- The pupils, who were eligible to take the Year 1 phonics test and were in receipt of Pupil Premium, passed the test.
- On Average, pupils in receipt of Pupil Premium across KS1 and KS2 made good progress in Reading, Writing and Mathematics.
- All pupils in receipt of Pupil Premium were able to access residential opportunities and school educational visits. Some were able to access after school clubs and peripatetic music teachers. These visits and experiences have supported their learning in class through self esteem building, also enriching their life experiences.
- Pupils in receipt of the Pupil Premium that have benefitted from the THRIVE approach have all made progress against their THRIVE assessments. The improvement in their social and emotional well-being has ensured that they have made progress in Reading, Writing and Maths.
- Some pupils in receipt of the Pupil Premium have benefitted from the use of ICT to allow them to access a broader curriculum.
- Some pupils in receipt of Pupil Premium funding, who have visual difficulties, have benefitted from vision screenings. This has enabled teachers to develop each individual child's area of need to prepare them for learning in the classroom.
- Our more able pupils who are in receipt of Pupil Premium funding, have benefitted from 1:1 support and small group work from a teacher or other staff members. These children are on track to reach above age related expectations at the end of Year 2 and 6.
- Our more able pupils have benefitted from the Pupil Premium funding through attending gifted and talented events that are run by outside agencies.



HEMYOCK PRIMARY SCHOOL PUPIL PREMIUM FUNDING FOR THE ACADEMIC YEAR 2017 – 2018

The school will receive £30,360 to spend on pupils eligible for Pupil Premium funding and this will benefit 21 children.

Our priorities for PP spending in 2017/18 are:

- To ensure KS1 pupil premium pupils make expected or greater depth progress in line with the national average.
- To ensure KS2 pupil premium pupils make expected or greater depth progress in line with the national average.
- To use targeted intervention strategies including small group work and 1:1 tuition.
- To employ an intervention staff to deliver personalised and bespoke programmes.
- To continue to fund THRIVE trained practitioners to support children with additional social and emotional needs.
- To continue to ensure earlier identification of pupils' specific needs, through termly pupil progress meetings and then planning appropriate strategies to support these needs.
- To continue to develop effective feedback on pupil performance.
- To offer financial support for clubs, enhanced curriculum provision and off-site visits.
- To use funding effectively to support identified pupil premium pupils in EYFS.
- To Increase attendance of pupil premium pupils (ensuring it is in line with national averages).
